TRACK TO SHARPLIN FALLS

Access again to the beautiful Sharplin Falls is one step closer thanks to a donation from the Ian Glassey Trust Fund through Advance Ashburton.

The popular 1.2km track through natural beech forest to the Sharplin Falls was closed after rockfalls in 2015 and 2016 destroyed part of the track. The Mt. Somers Walkway Society Working Group is making good progress towards the proposed new track.

The Assessment of Environmental Effects (AEE), which is a necessary and detailed piece of work is soon to be completed. Consultation with local Iwi is underway. An engineering design consultant has

commenced preparation of plans for a new bridge. The Working Group has applied to the Ashburton District Council for a resource consent and an application to the Department of Conservation (DOC) for a concession is in progress.

Once these technical steps are completed the project can be forwarded to DOC for final approval.

Charles Ross, chairman of the Mt. Somers Walkway Society says the Society is very grateful for the Advance Ashburton grant which allowed the AEE to be undertaken. "A new track to view the Falls will be a wonderful recreational opportunity for local people and visitors to our District". +

THE KAI FOR KIDS CHARITABLE TRUST

A pilot programme called Kai for Kids is providing a free, nutritious, hot lunch to children at Netherby School during Terms 3 and 4 in 2020 – with the aim of continuing this service into 2021 and extending to other schools in the district. All thanks to the generosity of donors through Advance Ashburton.

There is a considerable body of research from the Ministry of Health and the Child Poverty Action Group, which shows that feeding children at school is one of the greatest investments we can make, as a community, to help with effective learning for children. Common in other countries, a school lunch programme goes far beyond a plate of food and has been shown to produce benefits in education, health and nutrition, and social protection for children.

The Kai for Kids programme has a small team of volunteers who help to prepare and cook the lunches which are then delivered to Netherby School where a roster of parents help to serve the meal. Each meal contains a balance of vegetables, meat and

grains along with fruit and yoghurt. The favourite meals so far have included butter chicken, cottage pie, lasagne and vegetable soup. All meals are made from scratch using as much locally-grown produce as possible. Special meals are made for gluten and dairy-free children and for Halal cultural requirements.

Where possible cultural elements are incorporated into the meals. The inclusion of Banana Poke and custard as a dessert during Cook Island Language Week helps to recognise the different cultures in our school communities.

The next phase of the Kai for Kids programme is to create an urban farm garden, in conjunction with Trotts Community Garden, where the children and

volunteers will grow some of the vegetables to go into the lunch meals. It is also planned to include garden-to-plate cooking lessons for children and whānau members.

Some of the feedback from the children at Netherby School:

“Thank you so much for bringing Kai for Kids. My favourite meal so far had to be the pizza even though I don’t like homemade pizza but this was mind blowing.” Navaia

“I’ve loved most meals you have made for us so far. My favourite is the Shepherd’s pie. It was so Yum!!!” Renemoana.

“Thank you Kai for Kids team for making the best meals so far. My favourite meal was the lasagne because of everything in it. I just loved the effort your team put in all of the meals you gave us.” Michael +

THE ASHBURTON PALLIATIVE CARE CHARITABLE TRUST

For the past twenty-five years The Ashburton Palliative Care Charitable Trust has provided support for people needing financial help at the end of their lives.

Trustee Christine Dean said grants from the Trust fund have allowed a better quality of life for terminally ill patients. Families have felt supported with less financial pressure and, in some cases, the dreams of a dying person have been realised.

Recently the Trustees have handed the administration of their Fund to Advance Ashburton. Trustee Brendon Adam said, "We wanted the Trust to be more visible and accessible and active."

One of the key confidences that came with moving the Trust under Advance Ashburton's umbrella was knowing that funding decisions would be made within 24 hours, he said. Foundation Executive Officer, Sandi Wood says, "Our Grants

committee will be dedicated to the process the Palliative Care Trust has established and we'll honour the Trust's wishes to maintain this rapid response."

The Fund will continue accepting community donations to further the work of the Trust for activities and services that may fall through the traditional end-of-life funding gaps such as providing special dietary needs, Christmas gifts, sitter services and memory-making activities. It can

also be used to fund training for health professionals working in palliative care. Currently the Fund has \$61,500 including \$3,000 raised from a winter ball. It has been boosted by ongoing donations from fund raising and service clubs including Altrusa Ashburton, and from individuals and bequests.

WARM BABY, SAFE BABY

A *Warm Baby, Safe Baby* initiative by the Friends of Ashburton Hospital provides beanies, singlets, and small blankets, knitted in machine-washable wool, to all new-borns at Ashburton Hospital.

The wool yarn, funded by a grant from Advance Ashburton, is knitted by more than fifty volunteer knitters.

Organiser, Jane Riach, Secretary of the Friends, says there as many as 300 babies who are cared for in the maternity unit annually and staff had identified a need for warm woollen clothing for them.

“Wool has so many advantages and gives babies a great start by helping to regulate temperature and wick away moisture.

We are local knitters, using locally purchased wool, funded by a local funder all working together to deliver a great start to the health and wellbeing of our babies. Our catch cry - be a part of the 300!”, says Convenor of the Friends, Dorothea Webb. +
